

FIRST READING

Acts of the Apostles 2:1-11

When the time for Pentecost was fulfilled, they were all in one place together. RESPONSORIAL PSALM

Psalm 104



SECOND READING

Brothers and sisters: Those who are in the flesh cannot please God. But you are not in the flesh; on the contrary, you are in the spirit, if only the Spirit of God dwells in you. Whoever does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, although the body is dead because of sin, the spirit is alive because of righteousness.

PENTECOST SEQUENCE

The Pentecost Sequence, *Veni Sancte Spiritus* ("Come, Holy Spirit") is one of the four medieval sequences incorporated into the modern Roman Rite. Sung before the proclamation of the Gospel, it asks the Spirit to come and refresh our weary hearts.

Come, Holy Spirit, come! And from your celestial home Shed a ray of light divine!

Come, Father of the poor! Come, source of all our store! Come, within our bosoms shine.

You, of comforters the best; You, the soul's most welcome guest; Sweet refreshment here below;

In our labor, rest most sweet; Grateful coolness in the heat; Solace in the midst of woe.

O most blessed Light divine,
May that light within us shine
And our inmost being fill!
Where you are not, we have naught.



PRAYER OVER THE STATIONS OF THE CROSS







HONORING OUR FOUNDER AND OUR HISTORY

The Church of the Nativity of Our Lord enjoys a long and remarkable history. This history was honored through two well written parish history books which celebrated the 50th and then the 100th anniversary. As a part of our closing weekend, on Saturday morning we honored the founding pastor of Nativity Church, Fr. James O'Reilly, by praying Morning Prayer together. After his death in 1907, he was interred in the lower chapel at his request so that he could remain with the community. In love for him, and to honor as best we can his final request, he now rests in our Sacred Hearts Cemetery, to remain with us in South Side until the Resurrection.

We would like to express our deep gratitude to Elizabeth "Betsy" Gerner and Louis Kelly, who are the closest living kin of Fr. O'Reilly. They gave their blessing for his disinterment from the lower church and for his reinternment at Sacred Hearts Cemetery.

We were able to contact them in part due to a coincidental connection that we share. Through exhaustive genealogical research conducted by Don McKeon and Thomas Price we were able to determine that Betsy and Louis are the closest living kin of Fr. O'Reilly. When we began looking for their contact information, we discovered that the Caviston and Gerner families were already friends. Betsy Gerner's son (and Fr. O'Reilly's great-greatgrandnephew) GJ Gerner, and our own beloved parishioner Lexi Caviston-Ashmar both passed away from Glioblastoma. Lexi and GJ's families had become connected years ago through the network of good people working to raise funds to fight that horrible disease.

THE LIFE OF OUR FOUNDER FR. JAMES O'REILLY



"One of the most zealous and hard-working priests of the diocese and a man deserving of the highest confidence and esteem." Bishop Michael Hoban's description of Fr. James O'Reilly.

Born February 3, 1860 in St. Joseph in Susquehanna County, Pennsylvania, he was one of eleven children born to Terrence O'Reilly and Anastasia O'Reilly née Donnelly. His father was the brother of the legendary Fr. John Vincent O'Reilly, the "Pioneer Priest". The list of accomplishments of Fr. John Vincent is too long to properly summarize here, but due to those efforts he was called "the founder of the Diocese of Scranton" by Fr. John Gallagher, the author of *A Century of History: The Diocese of Scranton 1868-1968*. With the exceptional example set by their uncle, four of the O'Reilly sons became priests, including Fr. James and his twin brother Fr. Edward.

Fr. James O'Reilly received his early education at Saint Joseph's College near his home, an institution which had been founded by his uncle Fr. John Vincent. From there he attended Holy Cross in Worcester, Massachusetts, and received his seminary education at St. Mary's Seminary and University in Baltimore, Maryland.

After completing his education, he was ordained in August, 1888 by Bishop William O'Hara, the first bishop of the Diocese of Scranton. He was assigned as the assistant pastor at Holy Rosary Parish in



Saint Joseph's College, Susquehanna County

North Scranton. After two years he was transferred to Wilkes-Barre, but only a few months later he was named Rector of the Cathedral of St. Peter, Scranton.

The Cathedral parish which Fr. O'Reilly led had been established several decades before in the 1860s. The first parishioners of what would become the cathedral parish had initially worshiped in South Side at St. Bonaventure, a small church built in 1847. The combined Irish and German community outgrew the structure by the early 1850s. In 1853 it was decided that the German community would remain at St. Bonaventure (who would later build St. Mary of the Assumption Church in South Side) while the Irish community went across town to build a new church named for St. Vincent de Paul. That same congregation would later build a larger church, also named for St. Vincent de Paul, in 1867. This church became the cathedral in 1868 with the formation of the Diocese of Scranton. (It was later reconsecrated and renamed for St. Peter.)

Fr. O'Reilly led the Cathedral parish for 14 years. He certainly would have known of the long walk that many of his parishioners would take every week to attend Mass, and he certainly also would have known of the hardship of their lives due to harsh and dangerous labor conditions. It was then more than appropriate that when Bishop Michael Hoban announced in 1902 the formation of a new parish in South Side, that Bishop Hoban would choose as its first pastor Fr. O'Reilly. In his remaining time at the cathedral, Fr. O'Reilly began planning for the parish, and managed to raise \$15,000 before his assignment began.

Fr. O'Reilly first gathered the people of the new parish at St. John's Hall, which they modified to make appropriate for the celebration of the mass. The first mass was celebrated on November 1, 1903, and it was also on that day that

Fr. O'Reilly celebrated his first baptism at the parish, that of Thomas Hope.

(According to the parish records, Thomas remained a member of the parish until his death on October 5, 1973.)

On May 23, 1904, Fr. O'Reilly ceremoniously broke ground for the construction of Nativity Church and was present when the cornerstone was laid on July 31st. In reporting on the laying of the cornerstone, the *Scranton Times* stated that Fr. O'Reilly "is one of the most popular priests in the diocese and is dearly beloved by his parishioners. He has undertaken a large task in the building of a new church but is entering upon it cheerfully and willingly for the glory of God." The entire project was estimated to cost \$75,000.

A little over a year later, on July 17, 1905, with the structure complete, Fr. O'Reilly presided over the dedication of the lower church. Funds would still need to be raised to complete the work on the upper church, but while working toward that goal, the community could gather for worship in the

new building. In reporting on the event, the *Scranton Times* stated that Fr. O'Reilly "is entitled unstinted praise for the great work and perseverance he has displayed in securing the erection of so magnificent an edifice in a remarkable short period of time."

Fr. O'Reilly would continue his work for about two more years, shepherding the community and raising the funds to complete the church. Unfortunately, and tragically, however, Fr. O'Reilly would not see the completion of that work.



News reports from the time implied that Fr. O'Reilly

long suffered from a variety of ills but did so in silence. He would never let on that he was ever sick and rarely visited the doctor. His final illness began a few weeks before his death. He "took a cold" one day and sent for a doctor to come to the parish house, then at 533 South Webster Avenue. The doctor advised him to rest. But a pastor to the end, one evening when he was feeling a little better, he walked the three blocks to the church to greet a group of children preparing to receive their First Communion. On the walk back to the residence he "took another cold", was confined to bed, and called for the doctor.

His doctor recommended surgery to attempt to diagnose and correct the problem. Fr. O'Reilly was then carried from the residence to the hospital where the surgery was performed. It was discovered that his pancreas was the cause of his trouble, but that nothing could be done to save him. With his brothers at his side, they prayed together the prayers for the dying. With the end near, Fr. O'Reilly had the presence of mind to tell them goodbye. He then fell back in the bed and died in peace.

Bishop Hoban celebrated his funeral mass on May 29, 1907. In his eulogy for Fr. O'Reilly, Bishop Hoban began with a quote from the Book of Revelation: "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord. From henceforth now, saith the spirit that they may rest from their labors and their good works may follow them." He went to say that "words are not needed to tell you of his merits. It was not this church he wished to build up. What he wanted was to build you up. His works, indeed, do follow him. They now unite with your prayers. The chief work he was engaged in was to build up your hearts and your souls that you would ascribe to him under God the betterment of your lives." Bishop Hoban concluded with saying that "thanks to his family he is to be buried here. His heart was here. One of the last requests he made was that he might be buried here, and I gladly consented."

A similar sentiment was expressed by Bishop Henry Klonowski, the longtime pastor of our Sacred Hearts Parish here in South Side. Bishop Klonowski, before he died in 1973, is reported to have asked to be buried on the hill of the parish cemetery on Davis Street. He asked for this so that from the hill he could "watch over the flock."

While it is with sadness that we had to move Fr. O'Reilly, it is fitting that we honor as best we can his final wishes. His last request to Bishop Hoban was to stay with us here in South Side. In honor of that request, yesterday morning, June 7th, after praying the Church's Morning Prayer for the Dead, we reinterred him at the Sacred Hearts Cemetery. We buried him in a place of honor on the hill next to Bishop Klonowski. From there may they both watch over the flock of our parish while we wait together for the Day of the Resurrection.

A GIFT AND A MEMORY

At the conclusion of Mass after the Veneration of the Altar as we process out of the church, we will be handing out a small gift. Over a period of several months, a team of more than 20 volunteers worked to remove the stained glass windows from the lefthand and upper sacristies and the sacristy hallway, separated the individual rectangular panels, and replaced the glass in the windows with clear glass. The edges of the individual panels were then ground smooth on glass grinders, and the panels were cleaned. They were then laser etched with an image of Nativity Church, and the etching was highlighted using a gilding wax.



Wooden stands were made out of Cherry wood, a slit was cut in each side (one side so that you can display the panel perpendicularly, the other so that you can display it diagonally), and the message "A piece of stained glass from the Church of the Nativity of our Lord" was laser etched on each side. The stands were then sanded. Custom gift boxes were designed and manufactured. Then that same team of volunteers met on a Saturday morning to form a



production line to package the gift. Well over a 1,000 hours of labor went into this project, and it was done by volunteers from the parish and paid for with donations. In total we were able to produce 568 gifts.

It is given to you as a gift and a memory. May the Church of the Nativity of Our

Lord always remain in your heart, and may your cherished memories stand as a reminder that nothing we love is ever truly lost. The Lord holds them in His hands until it is time for us to receive them again, blessed and glorified. On the Day of the Resurrection - when the Lord fulfills His final and greatest promise to us - we will be gathered together once again. May that hope guide our lives.

May the road rise up to meet you, may the wind be always at your back, may the sun shine warm upon your face, and the rains fall soft upon your fields, and until we meet again, may God hold you in the palm of his hand.
